Nigel Murray was born near Aberdeen and studied the violin in London with Norbert Brainin, who first inspired him to study Bach's violin works in depth. He later studied in Switzerland and Italy before returning to London to become a member of the Yehudi Menuhin Festival Orchestra and the Academy of St. Martin's in the Fields. He gave many recitals in Britain and abroad with the pianist David Ward and as a member of the Georgian String Quartet. In 1971 he returned to Scotland to study for a B.Sc. at Edinburgh University, and since completing his degree he has been in charge of chamber music and



orchestral playing at St. Mary's Music School, as well as teaching the violin there.



Neil Mantle was born in London in 1951, but has lived in Edinburgh for the past 20 years. His boyhood ambition to be a conductor was realised in 1965 when he formed a chamber orchestra to gain practical experience. This group gave regular performances until 1969, when Mantle went to the RAM in London and the RSAM to study the horn, which remains his professional instrument. On returning to Edinburgh he formed Scottish Sinfonia (then called 'Sinfonietta') as a more professional-standard orchestra. Scottish Sinfonia now give five orchestral concerts a year and

play for the Edinburgh Opera Company, which Neil Mantle has conducted since 1975. Their recent performances of Wagner's Flying Dutchman drew unanimous praise from the critics. In 1973 Neil Mantle won the Hugh S. Roberton Conducting Prize.

Jack Brymer was born in South Shields, Co. Durham, and studied at London University. He spent his early adult years as a schoolmaster, and after war service with the RAF he returned to the profession until 1947, when he was invited by Sir Thomas Beecham to take the post of Principal Clarinet with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, a post he occupied for sixteen years. During this time he extended his activities to chamber music and solo playing both here and abroad, and was founder member of several wellknown ensembles such as the Wigmore, the London Baroque and the Prometheus Ensemble. He was also a professor with the degree of HonRAM at the Royal Academy of Music, and in 1973 he was awarded the degree of MA by Newcastle University, Between 1963 and 1972 he was Principal Clarinet with the BBC Symphony Orchestra and he now holds the same position with the London Symphony Orchestra as well as being a member of the Robles Ensemble and the Delmé Ensemble.

Jack Brymer is often seen and heard on television and radio not only as a performer but as a speaker on musical topics, and his two lecture-films in the educational series "We Make Music" are viewed the world over. He has recorded most of the important works for his instrument and is Director of the well-known Wind Soloists. He is author of the book on Clarinet in the Yehudi Menuhin Music Guide Series and has written an autobiography "From Where I Sit"

He was awarded the OBE in 1960.
