Scottish Sinfonia was formed in 1970 by Neil Mantle. It was originally a chamber orchestra but was expanded to its present size in 1976. It has quickly built up an enviable reputation as a first-class ensemble with a definite sound and style of its own, and has attracted consistently good notices in the press since its inception. Many large-scale works normally considered outwith the scope of amateur orchestras have been successfully performed; they include Mahler's Sixth Symphony, when the orchestra was augmented to 120 players, and several of the Bruckner symphonies and Strauss tone poems. Distinguished soloists who have appeared recently with the orchestra include Jack Brymer, John Tunnell, Yaltah Menuhin, Roderick Brydon and Joan Dickson.
