have been successfully performed; they include several of the Bruckner and Mahler symphonies, the Strauss tone poems, Ravel Daphnis and Chloë and, most recently, Webern's Passacaglia. For several years the orchestra's joint performances with the Edinburgh Opera Company, also conducted by Neil Mantle, formed an important part of the orchestra's schedule. The highlights of that association were the performances of Wagner's 'Flying Dutchman' (1979) and 'Tannhäuser' (1981), when the quality of the orchestral playing attracted unanimous critical acclaim. To renew the Sinfonia's links with opera, a new company, Sinfonia Opera, has recently been formed and makes its debut in October. Distinguished soloists who have appeared recently with the Sinfonia include Jack Brymer, Yaltah Menuhin, Roderick Brydon, Joan Dickson and Leonard Friedman.
