THE PEARL FISHERS

The action takes place in Ceylon in the seventeenth century.

The pearl fishers are prosperous because they are daring; once a year they travel to a headland where the finest pearls are found. They bring their families and build a camp near an ancient shrine to the Hindu god Brahma. But the waters round this headland are very treacherous and many divers have been lost in sudden storms. To protect themselves from disaster, the pearl fishers bring with them their priest and whe dancers from their home temple. They also send to Kandy for a special priestess who will offer constant prayers on their behalf. She must take a vow of chastity and remain veilled and unknown.

The story before the opera begins:

The pearl fisher Zurga was once pursued by brigands when carrying a consignment of pearls. His life was saved by a little girl who hid him in her father's house and refused, even when her life was threatened, to betray him. In graditude he gave her a necklace. This little girl grew up to become the priestess Leila. Some years later Zurga and his friend Nadir travelled to Kandy and there in the temple saw a young priestess (Leila) with whom they both fell in love. A jealous quarrel broke out between them but because they were blood-brothers they vowed never to see her again. No longer able to bear each other's company, they parted. Zurga fulfilled his oath but Nadir returned to Kandy and secretly wooed Leila.

ACT I

The pearl fishers have arrived at their annual camp-site. They seek the protection of Brahma with gifts and dances and they elect Zurga as their leader during the dangerous days ahead. Nadir, whom Zurga has not seen since their quarrel, appears and the two are reconciled, each swearing he has been true to his oath. They recall their first sight of Leila, then Zurga invites Nadir to join the fishers. The veiled priestess arrives. She is Leila. She recognises Nadir, although he does not recognize her, but takes the solemn vows which Zurga administers.

At nightfall the pearl fishers put out to sea but Nadir remains behind. He feels guilty because he has deceived Zurga. He thinks of Leila and falls asleep dreaming that she is near. Leila is led by the priest Nourabad into the shrine where, lit by a brazier, she is visible to the fishing fleet. She invokes the protection of Brahma upon it. She parts her veil a little and Nadir, who has awoken, recognises her.

- INTERVAL -

ACT II

The fleet has returned safely. Nourabad comes to release Leila from her vigil. To prove to him that she will keep her vows she tells him the story of how she saved a brave man from brigands and shows him the necklace. Leila falls asleep. She is awoken by Nadir's voice and he climbs up into the shrine and they pledge their love. As he leaves a shot rings out. Nourabad and his guards have seen him and go in pursuit. A storm breaks. The pearl fishers hurry to the shrine for protection. Nourbad returns with the captured Nadir and denounces him and Leila as lovers. The pearl fishers are about to lynch Nadir when Zurga arrives and intervenes. He has Nadir and Leila released and bids them go. As they do so Nourabad tears off Leila's veil. Zurga recognises her and knows his friend has betrayed him. He condemns them both to death.

ACT III scene I:

Zurga, alone and sleepless, thinks of Nadir and Leila and is tortured by remorse. Leila, guarded, comes to him and begs him to free Nadir. She alone will be the sacrifice. At the sight of her Zurga's jealousy returns and he refuses. Nourabad and some fishermen come to announce that dawn, the hour of execution, approaches. Leila gives her necklace to a young diver and asks him to give it to her mother. After she has been taken away Zurga recognises the necklace.

scene 2

The pearl fishers prepare for the execution. Suddenly they see a glow in the east and believe that dawn has come. But Zurga rushes on to announce that the camp is on fire and all must go if they wish to save their children and goods. When Nourabad and the crowd have hurried away Zurga tells Leila he is repaying her for saving his life when she was a child, for it is he who has set fire to the camp. He releases her and Nadir and gives them his boat for their escape.
